



What is the Purpose of Jewish Education?

A Jewish education must not only teach Jewish texts and traditions, but also train youth to use that knowledge to affect their actions, to achieve one of our “so whats,” the creation of ethical relationships that spawn peaceful, just communities. Today, we must expand that notion of community to the global level. We have never had such facility in establishing relationships with one another. Technology has radically changed the nature of the “relationship” game. Not only do we know immediately what is occurring across the world; we often know immediately the intimate details of strangers. Even the vocabulary of relationships is in radical flux. When Aristotle wrote about friendship in his Nicomachean Ethics, he assumed that friends were face to face contacts, with regular physical interactions. His notion of civic friendship, in which human beings treat each other and themselves with respect, compassion, moral rigor, and justice, depends on this definition (see e.g. Books XIII and IX). Today, though, Facebook has changed the definition of the word “friend,” and therefore, the ethical guidelines about how we relate to people with whom we are in some type of intimate relationship, but with whom we have no true intimacy, must be redefined. We need fresh perspectives regarding how to live together in our global, inexorably intertwined community.

A Jewish educational environment must take seriously the ultimate destiny of the global community. We have a responsibility to train children receiving a Jewish education to use their Jewish knowledge, understanding, tools, and perspectives to make an impact on the world, incorporating a highly developed system of interpersonal ethical attitudes to a fast-paced world of thousands of “friendships” that often leaves people treacherously alone.

I believe that a Jewish education should include training in “ethical activism.” Rabbi Avi Weiss, in his book Principles of Spiritual Activism (2002), writes: “being an activist is about much more than being involved in what some call the ‘big causes,’ those that receive the most attention in the media. The ‘little causes,’ those that touch the lives of relatively few and go largely unnoticed, are equally vital... True activism is the realization that the greatest causes of all involve basic human needs”. A Jewish education, regardless of denomination or venue, should, in addition to teaching knowledge, teach students to weave their knowledge into profound understanding, and use that understanding to inform their behavior. No matter what we teach our students about Judaism, we should ensure that they are trained to connect Jewish beliefs and practices with their own lives, with the way in which they treat themselves and others. Ultimately, the Jewish education our children receive should manifest itself in Jewishly-grounded ethical action. Their behavior, private and public, should be richly informed by their Jewish learning, and should contribute to the making of an ethical, just, peaceful world. *Excerpted from Zeek on Forward.com*



Purim is March 1! Here's Your Your To-Do List

Listen to the Megillah



To relive the miraculous events of Purim, listen to the reading of the Gantse Megillah (entire book of Esther). And not just once but twice: Saturday night, March 11, and again on Purim day. Tell the children that Purim is the only time when it's a mitzvah to make noise! And don't forget to stamp out Haman's name.

Give to the needy (Matanot La'Evyoni)

Concern for the needy is a year-round responsibility, but on Purim it is a special mitzvah to remember the poor. Give charity to at least two (but preferably more) needy individuals on Purim day.



Send food portions to friends (Mishloach Manot)



On Purim we emphasize the importance of Jewish unity and friendship by sending gifts of food to friends. On Purim day, send a gift of at least two kinds of ready-to-eat foods (e.g., pastry, fruit, beverage) to at least one friend.

Eat, Drink and Be Merry

Purim should be celebrated with a special festive meal on Purim day, at which family and friends gather together to rejoice in the Purim spirit. It is a mitzvah to drink wine or other inebriating drinks at this meal.



Purim Customs: Masquerades and Hamantashen

It is customary for children to dress up and disguise themselves an allusion to the fact that the miracle of Purim was disguised in natural garments. This is also the significance behind a traditional Purim food, the hamantash—a pastry whose filling is hidden within a three-cornered crust.

Hadassah Happenings

On Friday, March 2nd, we'll be hosting the pre-services Oneg from 5:30-6:00 pm at Mitzvah Congregation. That will also be Mizpah's traditional First Friday meal and all Hadassah members with their families are invited to come at the Mizpah member's prices. Thank you Rabbi Craig Lewis!

We'll be honoring nurses and other medical providers, including a D'Var Torah by Federation shlichah Chen Dahan, who will explain the relationship with Hadassah's 100 year anniversary marking the number of years we've provided such care in Israel. Sandy will be organizing services with the help of chapter members and support of Rabbi Craig Lewis. Send your RSVP to Mizpah.

We'll be celebrating the 100th anniversary of Hadassah's innovative School of Nursing and laud its outstanding graduates who continue to be a vital force at Hadassah Medical Organization and beyond. Hadassah founder Henrietta Szold visited Palestine early in the 20th century. She was shocked by Jerusalem's poverty and filthy living conditions, soaring infant mortality rate, and ignorance of the most basic hygiene. In 1912, she founded Hadassah with members of her Zionist study group. From the start, their goal was "The healing of the daughter of my people," from Jeremiah. Less than a year later, two American nurses—Rose Kaplan and Rachel Landy—set sail for Jerusalem. They set up Hadassah's first public health and welfare station in a stone house. March 23, 1913, was the first time Hadassah brought healing to Jerusalem.

Today, Hadassah hospitals treat one million patients annually, without regard to race, religion or nationality. Hospitals from Israel and the entire region routinely send the most complicated and critical cases to Hadassah—a testament to the world-class medical care its doctors and nurses provide. Hadassah Medical Organization (HMO) was nominated for a Nobel Peace Prize in 2005 for its promotion of Jewish-Arab cooperation and human values. From the first, Hadassah has built bridges to peace through medicine. The Henrietta Szold Hadassah Hebrew University School of Nursing has remained in the forefront of nursing education. Its more than 2,500 graduates have been leaders in the field of nursing in Israel and abroad for 100 years. Invariably, the school is ahead of the curve with new goals and practices as the body of medical knowledge expands.

How better to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Hadassah nurses, in addition to our March 2nd Oneg and services at Mizpah Congregation? How about starting with social media? How about #Chai5aNurse! This program is designed to promote pride in nurses, the profession of nursing, and the huge contributions made by Hadassah and Hadassah nurses. That includes all the nurses who have graduated from the Henrietta Szold Hadassah-Hebrew University School of nursing and our members and supporters who are nurses, including members of our local and national Nurses Councils. Share your #Chai5aNurse posts to Facebook, Instagram, Twitter or anywhere else you'd use a hashtag.

Here's how it works:

Option 1: Celebrate a Nurse in Real-Time

Tell the nurses in your life that you're celebrating nurses with Hadassah this year and let them know how much you respect what they do. Take a selfie of yourself high-fiving a nurse in your life – this can be a friend or loved one, or a nurse at a medical office. Be sure to ask them if it's OK for you to share their photo (just your hands high-fiving or all of them, depending on their preference).

Option 2: Tell the World Why You Love Nurses.

Cut out our sign (see below). Add a few words of your own to it. Hold up your sign and take a selfie of yourself with the sign. Share the picture on social

media. Be sure to include the hashtag #Chai5aNurse in the post you write to go with your selfie. Tag a nurse – or several – and let them know how much you respect their work.

Option 3: Tell the World Why You Love Being a Nurse

Cut out our sign (below). Add a few words of your own to it. Hold up your sign and take a selfie. Be sure to include the hashtag #Chai5aNurse in the post you write to go with your selfie. Tag the nurses in your life and anyone else who you think might enjoy the post.

Option 4: Celebrate a Hadassah Nurse.

Throughout the year, we'll feature stories online for you to share about Hadassah nurses in action and the power of women who heal.
