


What is the Jewish Early Childhood Initiative?

Shedding Light on the Candlelight

Every day we perform mitzvot without even thinking about it. Sometimes a mitzvah is something you do individually and sometimes it is a family affair. We are all blessed with shelter, clothing, good health, food and family members who care about us. During our celebration of Chanukah, we need to reflect each night to think about how we can perform a different mitzvah for each of the eight nights of Chanukah. I would like to offer the following for the eight nights:

The First Candle

Fulfill the mitzvah of MAZON - feeding the hungry. Light one candle for the Jews who tonight have no place to light candles. After the candle is lit, put aside a box or can of food so you can donate it to a local food pantry.

The Second Candle

Tonight, work towards KLAL YISRAEL, unity of the Jewish people. Light two candles for two family members who cannot light candles with you tonight. After the candles are lit, go and call or write a Chanukah card to two family members. Be sure to remember any grandparents!

The Third Candle

Fulfill the mitzvah of PIDYON SHIVUYIM - redeeming captives. Tonight as you light three candles, look at the world around you and imagine those who couldn't even light one Chanukah candle. Write a letter to your senator or congress-person on behalf of one oppressed group of people or make a donation to HIAS.

The Fourth Candle

Fulfill the mitzvah of BIKUR CHOLIM- visiting the sick. Light four candles and remember those who haven't received even one present on this holiday of Chanukah. Purchase a small Chanukah gift for a child. Bring it to a nearby hospital pediatric ward.

The Fifth Candle

Fulfill the mitzvah of HACHNASAT ORCHIM – welcoming guests, and brighten up someone's day. Light five candles for the five days of the week. Invite new friends, old friends and family!

The Sixth Candle

Tonight, focus on the mitzvah of KEDUSHAH - the capacity to focus our attention and recognize the "specialness" of things. Take one thing that you do every day (for example, brushing your teeth, getting dressed) and write a blessing to recognize the "specialness" of this activity.

The Seventh Candle

Fulfill the mitzvah of SHALOM BAYIT – household harmony. After you light seven candles, list seven things that you, as an individual, can do to help out your family members. Have a family conference and, after you promise to try out your list, discuss exchanging a gift for this holiday that would enhance the whole family.

The Eighth Candle

Light eight candles and smile! Tonight, with the chanukiah fully ablaze, work towards TIK-KUN OLAM - REPAIRING THE WORLD. Complete one activity that might eliminate the darkness of someone else's life.


Wednesday, December 12th at noon




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

Be a Part of the Miracle

1931, in Kiel, Germany, the last night Chanukah, Rabbi Akiva Boruch Posner, spiritual leader of the town, lit his Chanukah menorah. Directly across from the Posner's home stood the Nazi headquarters in Kiel, displaying the dreaded Nazi Party flag. Rabbi Posner's wife, Rachel, snapped a photo of the menorah, capturing the Nazi building and flag in the background.

Mrs. Posner wrote a few lines in German on the back of the photo: Chanukah, 5692 (1931). 'Judea dies,' thus says the banner. 'Judea will live forever,' thus respond the Chanukah lights.

One year later, Hitler became Chancellor of Germany and the Nazis held a torch-lit procession through the famous Brandenburg Gate in Berlin to celebrate Hitler's seizure of power.

A few weeks ago at the Conference of Chabad Shluchim, I heard from my colleague, Rabbi Yehudah Teichtel, Chief Rabbi of Berlin. And he shared with us that on the 85th anniversary of the onset of the Holocaust, he went to visit the President of Germany, Frank Walter Steinmeier.

Rabbi Teichtel shared with the German president the words that he heard from the person who sent him to Berlin, the Lubavitcher Rebbe, that in the place where we saw the greatest darkness we must bring in the greatest light.


The president responded that he wants Germany to put up a massive grand menorah right at the Brandenburg Gate in Berlin, in the exact spot where Hitler stood and gave his fiery speeches on the urgent need to rid the world from the bacteria of the Jewish people, their Torah and their G-d.

If you go to the Brandenburg Gate this year on Chanukah, you will observe the president of Germany, a position once held by Hitler himself, lighting the *shamash* of the Chanukah menorah in the spot where the greatest enemy of the Jewish people stood just a few decades ago.

Rachel Posner, wrote on her photo: Chanukah, 1931. 'Judea dies,' thus says the banner. 'Judea will live forever,' thus respond the Chanukah lights. Who was right?!

Today the picture and menorah are on display in Yad Vashem. Yet there was one condition made: each year it is removed to be used by the descendants of Rabbi and Rebbetzin Posner. This year Akiva Mansbach, who is named after his grandfather, will light the menorah with his family. "This is our way" said Akiva, "of being part of the miracle. This Menorah reminds of the obligation to ensure throughout the year that Judea will live forever." (from Chabad.org)


