





Did you know that we celebrate the holiday of Rosh Chodesh once a month? We are celebrating the new moon. Our Jewish calendar follows the cycles of the moon as it waxes and wanes in the night sky. Twelve months make up the calendar and they are: Tishre, Cheshvan, Kislev, Tevet, Shevat, Adar, Nisan, Iyar, Sivan, Tammuz, Av, Elul


Each month contains approximately 29.5 days. When you add this up, we will come out with 354 days. Because festivals are tied with certain seasons and the rhythms of agriculture, we have a leap year with an extra month every two to three years. As you know according the Jewish calendar, this is 5779. This year we have a leap year, which means we have 2 Adar's. The following will take place:

Shevat is thirty days. Adar I is thirty days. Adar II is twenty nine days; its Rosh Chodesh is two days. Purim will fall in Adar II this year. Nisan contains 30 days, and its Rosh Chodesh is one day.

Rosh Chodesh is celebrated in different ways. In the time of the Temple, special sacrifices were brought to the Temple. Trumpets were played and special sacrifices were brought to the Temple. Today, we say a special blessing on the Shabbat before the new moon. We ask that this be a time of goodness and blessings. Also, Rosh Chodesh is a special time for women. Often women's groups meet on a monthly basis to celebrate.

Rosh Chodesh is February 6, which is when we begin Adar I. Keep track of the moon for 29.5 days. See how the moon changes from new to waxing to waning. Have fun!



The Virtue of Patience

There's an old English proverb: "The early bird catches the worm." The earlier you get started, the better your shot at success. But did you ever wonder what would happen if the bird got there too early? If the worm hasn't emerged yet, then being early is not an advantage.

In life, we are often impatient. We are eager to move on to the next big thing, and we rush to get there as soon as we can. We feel like that next milestone must be met today and that next goal needs to be achieved now.

But is this really a healthy urge? Do we sometimes fall into the trap of "arriving" too early?

This year, in the Jewish calendar, is a leap year. We add an extra month (Adar I) so that Passover will fall during the spring.

The Jewish months are based on the cycle of the moon 354 days—11 days less than the solar year of 365 days. To avoid falling into this trap, we have the leap year.

There is a profound lesson here: rushing ahead is not always advantageous.

It is only appropriate for this holiday to be in the spring. Spring is that season of new beginnings.

The same is true in life. Just because something is good, it doesn't mean it's good for you now. One has to make sure the timing is right before setting off in pursuit of a dream. -- Chabad.org




