Teen Interfaith Event at Mizpah, January 27th



In December, the Jewish Federation hosted an interfaith clergy luncheon to explore ways to work collaboratively within the faith communities to help combat all forms of hate. At that luncheon, the idea of engaging our youth with some sort of diversity training was suggested by Alison Lebovitz, who happens to serve as both co-advisor for The Jew Crew and co-chair of Mayor Andy Berke's Council Against Hate. Just a few weeks later, that idea became reality when The Jew Crew hosted the very first teen interfaith event at Mizpah Congregation. The program drew thirty-five attendees, including clergy and mostly high school students from various churches, such as St. Timothy's on Signal Mountain, St. Francis of Assisi Episcopal and St. Peter's Episcopal. UTC Professor Dr. Gail Dawson presented on the topic of stereotypes, using clips from the movie Zootopia to engage the teens in a provocative and powerful discussion. The teens shared deeply moving and personal stories with one another, talking about their own experiences with bullying, hate speech and discrimination, and everyone in attendance agreed that this was just the first of many interfaith educational and social activities to come.

Machanooga has been going strong since August of 2018. Our children have built a kehillah--a community--for every Sunday morning. Our day begins with shira-music led by either Rabbi Tendler, Rabbi Lewis, Lily Dropkin, Jan Suhrbier, or Betty Golub and our madrachim.

Class follows our shira. Our Pre-K students are spending the year learning about Jewish holidays, bible stories, and Israel. Rabbi Lewis teaches our older students "Jewish Values for the 21st Century." This course helps our students learn to think critically about ethics and values in their everyday lives. The curriculum for our Kindergarten through 6th grade is values-based from Shalom Learning. Our students are learning about:

There are hands-on activities for each of these values, as well as educational videos from Bim Bam and Shaboom. These are great videos for the family!

Our chugim clubs conclude our morning activities. The chugim have ranged from weaving, chess, Mine Craft, taking care of the earth and its inhabitants, creating a newspaper, learning how to take care of an opossum, and painting, to name a few.

Machanooga has been extremely fortunate to have Chen Dahan, our shlichah- emissary from Israel, working with our students. Once a month Chen shares her love of Israel with us through programs ranging from learning about Jerusalem to what it would be like to be a member of the IDF.

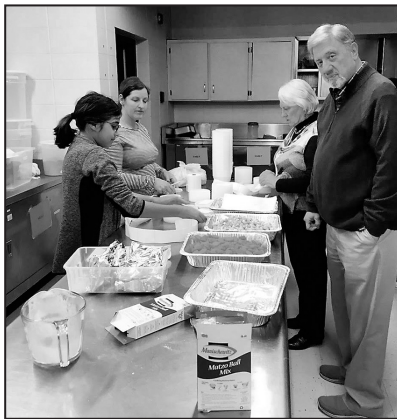

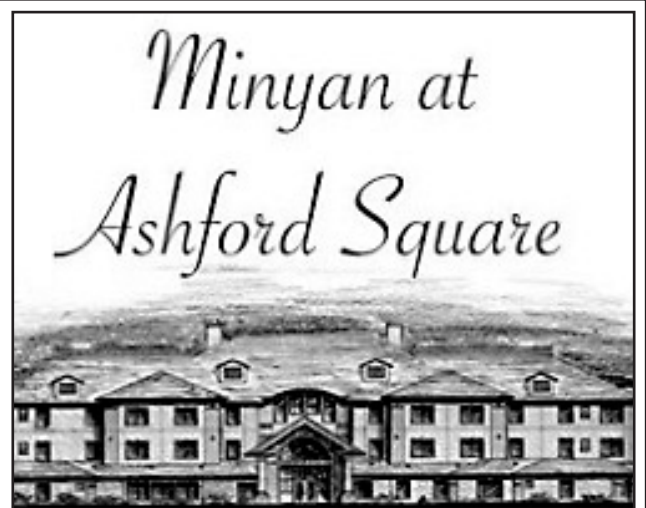

Purim is March 21! Here's What to Do!



Listen to the Megillah

To relive the miraculous events of Purim, listen to the reading of the Gantse Megillah (entire book of Esther). And not just once but twice: Saturday night, March 11, and again on Purim day. Tell the children that Purim is the only time when it's a mitzvah to make noise! And don't forget to stamp out Haman's name.



Give to the needy (Matanot La'Evyoni)

Concern for the needy is a year-round responsibility, but on Purim it is a special mitzvah to remember the poor. Give charity to at least two (but preferably more) needy individuals on Purim day.



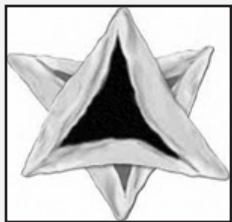
Send food portions to friends (Mishloach Manot)

On Purim we emphasize the importance of Jewish unity and friendship by sending gifts of food to friends. On Purim day, send a gift of at least two kinds of ready-to-eat foods (e.g., pastry, fruit, beverage) to at least one friend.



Eat, Drink and Be Merry

Purim should be celebrated with a special festive meal on Purim day, at which family and friends gather together to rejoice in the Purim spirit. It is a mitzvah to drink wine or other inebriating drinks at this meal.



Purim Customs: Masquerades and Hamantashen

It is customary for children to dress up and disguise themselves an allusion to the fact that the miracle of Purim was disguised in natural garments. This is also the significance behind a traditional Purim food, the hamantash—a pastry whose filling is hidden within a three-cornered crust.
