The decision to break from our 30+ years as a traditional newspaper format and go to a magazine format took a great deal of planning, research, discussion, and consultation. We looked at many other magazines from around the country - Jewish, cultural, secular, and more. We worked with a graphic designer to make sure we understood the process. The new *Shofar* debuted in September, and we couldn't be prouder.

We know you depend on the *Shofar* each month to bring you news of the Jewish community and of

Federation and congregational programs. The new *Shofar* magazine will continue to be your source for this kind of information, along with our website, is wishehattaneese com

In addition to all the planning and research that went into creating our new *Shofar*, we also had to find a new printing house that was willing and able to handle our monthly order at an efficient price. The *Shofar* newspapers were printed in Summerville, Georgia, and then shipped by UPS to our mailing house in Chattanooga, where they were addressed and barcoded-- all of which figured into the cost. Now our mailing house here in Chattanooga handles all parts of the process, from printing to mailing. Although the cost to produce a glossy magazine is more than the cost to produce a newspaper, the overall increase is less than \$150 per month (and we print over 800 magazines!). We think it's well worth the added expense to showcase our community in the best, most modern light we can.

Informed Community Voices: Our Greatest Asset

As you may know, over the past few years the Jewish Federation has implemented several leadership programs, which have been facilitated

by Ken Goldsmith. As a result of these, we have created a leadership cohort of twenty-four people. We are

inviting this cohort to be a "think-tank," bringing its ideas to the issues we think are important to the Federation or to the community.

Initially we used the Yesod leadership model. The Yesod curriculum, developed through the Florence Melton School of Adult Jewish Learning, was written by Dr. Erica Brown. This course of study offers insights into personal and organizational leadership through a Jewish perspective. Course content merges Judaic text study, business skills, leadership theory, and experiential application.

But we found that although Erica Brown's method included Jewish text, there was a significant piece of

leadership training that was missing. It took us awhile what that missing piece

was, but we finally figured it out: it is the local piece. What Jewish leadership activities have taken place locally, recently or historically? What part of the community do we represent? What are the current local Jewish community's concerns? And what are the greater Chattanooga community's concerns that the Jewish community can impact?

Ken Goldsmith. Michael Dzik and I have taken parts of Yesod's general leadership training and added panels with local speakers. Herb Cohn, Sanford Winer, Alan Richelson, Austin Center, and Rachel Schulson are among those who spoke to the last leadership class. The discussions that occurred at the end of the last class spurred the implementation of a JSO (Jewish Student Organization) at UTC, headed by Susan Matzkin and Barbie Potts, with Tom Balazs as the faculty advisor. The discussions about future updates to the Federation's facility and marketing led in part to the new Shofar format.

The cohort "think-tank" of past leadership participants meets about every eight weeks. They have conversed around the topic of, among other things, "how to make the Federation "cool"." The last cohort meeting in September discussed "The Changing Dynamic:

Volunteer Roles and Responsibilities." All but a few past participants have either joined these meetings or have taken on greater roles within the Jewish community.

Recently someone asked me, "Do you have to be a young adult to participate in the leadership classes?" The answer is no. Current Board Chair Austin Center and incoming Board Chair Mike Spector have both participated in classes and although they are young at heart, I think we all know that neither is under thirty (insert smile emoji!).

We encourage the Jewish community to participate whether single, coupled, interfaith, interracial, or LGBTQ. The past participants are reflective of the diversity in the Federation's community. The only

requirements are that you be supportive of the Jewish community, and that you donate to the Federation's annual campaign at any level.

Annual Jewish Documentary Film Series Begins Jan. 15

In January 2020, the Annual Jewish Documentary Film Series kicks off at the Jewish Cultural Center. Frank Miller heads the committee this year, of which I am a member, along with Stephen Black, Sheila St. Aubin, Richard Zachary, and our advisor, Ann Treadwell.

The Annual Jewish Documentary Film Series is important for a number of reasons. It brings Jewish-themed, historically and culturally important stories to Chattanooga that otherwise would not be seen here. This is part of the Jewish Cultural Center's outreach to promote Jewish ideals and values.

As Chairman Frank Miller says, "The Chattanooga Jewish Documentary Film Series allows attendees to learn new information about Jewish individuals who are well known, and also to learn about lesser-known persons who have led fascinating lives. We learn new facts about events known to us as well, and we learn about events previously unknown to us. The stories of the Jewish people are utterly fascinating. We hope all patrons learn something that stimulates their desire to know more about who we are."

We are currently in the process of selecting the four films that will be shown on four consecutive Wednesday evenings beginning January 15, 2020. In the past years we have shown many outstanding documentaries. IN CASE YOU MISSED THEM, I have listed six of the best films from prior years with information about how you can see them at home. This will give you an idea of the quality of films to come.

ORCHESTRA OF EXILE In the early 1930's, Hitler began firing Jewish musicians across Europe. Overcoming extraordinary obstacles, violinist Bronislaw Huberman moved these great musicians to Palestine and formed a symphony that would become the Israel Philharmonic Orchestra, thus saving the lives of 1,000 Jews. *Available from: Amazon Prime and Netflix*

HAVA NAGILA (The Movie) A documentary on the history, mystery and meaning of the ubiquitous Jewish standard that follows the around-the-world journey of the song from Ukraine to Youtube. *Available from: Amazon, Netflix, iTunes, and Vudu*

WHO WILL WRITE OUR HISTORY In November 1940, days after the Nazis sealed 450,000 Jews in the Warsaw Ghetto, a secret band of journalists, scholars, and community leaders decided to fight back. Led by historian Emanuel Ringelblum and known by the code name Oyneg Shabes, this clandestine group vowed to defeat Nazi lies and propaganda not with guns or fists but with the ultimate weapon, the truth. *Available from: Amazon, iTunes, Google Play and Vudu*

ABOVE AND BEYOND In 1948, a group of American pilots flew for Israel in its War of Independence. The first feature-length documentary about the foreign airmen in the '48 War, ABOVE AND BEYOND weaves interviews and footage to present a fascinating, little-known tale. *Available from: Amazon Prime and Netflix*

ROSENWALD Julius Rosenwald, the head of Sears Roebuck, devoted much of his life to philanthropy, particularly concerning African-American causes, in an era when racism was rampant. He helped fund over 5,300 schools during the early part of the 20th century, most of them in the Jim Crow South and went on to give away some \$62 million by his death. *Available from: The National Center for Jewish Film and Ciesla Foundation*

PORTRAIT OF WALLY

The story of a Nazi-looted painting, Egon Schiele's "Portrait of Wally", which was discovered on the walls of the Museum of Modern art in 1997, triggering an historic court case that pitted the Manhattan District Attorney, the United states Government and the heirs of a Viennese gallery owner against a major Austrian museum and MoMA. *Available from: Amazon and Amazon Prime*

Medicare Open Enrollment Returns October 15



Medicare Enrollment is upon us again!!!! **Medicare enrollment opens October 15th and will end December 7th.** Postcards went out in September. Please call Jake Balser, our Executive Assistant, at 493-0270 once you receive your postcard

and he will mail you the 2020 Medicare forms to complete. We will also include a self-addressed stamped envelope for your convenience. Once we receive these forms back and they are COMPLETE, Jake will begin calling and making appointments for you to meet with me for Medicare Part D enrollment. *Please understand, this is on a first come first serve basis.* Medicare forms need to be accurately and completely filled out in order for this to run effectively and efficiently. To make this event a little sweeter, Alice and Sandra will be baking cookies and cake and serving this up with coffee!

Medicare Enrollment in Tennessee by the Numbers:

As of November 2018, <u>1,326,033</u> Tennessee residents had Medicare coverage, including those with Original Medicare and those with Medicare Advantage. That's a little more than 19 percent of the state's total population, compared with a little more than 18 percent of the United States population enrolled in Medicare.

Of Tennessee's Medicare beneficiaries, 80 percent are eligible based on their age (ie, being at least 65 years old), while the other 20 percent are eligible due to a disability. Nationwide, 84 percent of Medicare beneficiaries are eligible due to age, while 16 percent are eligible due to disability. But as of 2011, Tennessee was among the states with the highest percentage of their residents receiving disability benefits, so it makes sense that the percentage of Medicare beneficiaries in the state who qualify because of a disability is higher than the national average. *Source: https://www.tn.gov/aging/our-programs/state-healthinsurance-assistance-program--ship-.html*
